# A two-horse race?

THE battle for the **ECB Premier League** title looks to have become a two horse race after the surprise defeat of outsiders Hyde at Alderley Edge.

Neston and Chester Boughton Hall, neither of whom has previously won the honour, both scored comfortable victories over Macclesfield and Marple respectively to retain the nine points gap between one and two, now with just six games remaining.

Neston threw off the disappointment of their RedInsure T20 Final defeat by Hyde in mid-week with a storming 10 wickets victory over bottom club Macclesfield in a game which featured three fine centuries. On a near-perfect Parkgate pitch and outfield, Macclesfield did well to rack up a tally of 276, Melbourne batsman Nick Ross following up his maiden ton against Toft the prevoous week with a magnificent 145 not out off 116 balls with 15 fours and four sixes. He and Khalid Sawas, 65, enjoyed a 141 third-wicket stand as Andy Clarke (3-101) and his colleagues struggled.

Neston set about their task with relish and 38.4 overs later they had reached their target at 280 without loss. Will Evans scored 160 not out (21 fours sand six sixes) and his skipper David Hurst 114 not out (25 fours and three sixes). The season's highest premiership partnership thus earned Neston all 25 points and kept them in top spot, while Macclesfield's miserly eight points return means they stay well and truly bottom.

Meanwhile, Chester beat Marple by six wickets at Filkins Lane in a less spectacular but efficient manner after restricting their visitors to 150 - after reaching 78-0, Jon Marshall 40. Alex Kegg made a fine comeback after threatening to retire earlier in the season with a 6-36.return which contained hardly a bad ball,. Chester's reply of 151-4 in just 22 overs was highlighted by an unbeaten 69 from Lee Dixon and 42 by Jordan Clark.

Hyde were dismissed for 133, their lowest score of the season at Alderley Edge, thus ending to a rousing run of five wins in six games. Jason Whittaker destroyed their strong batting line-up with 6-49 return off 16 lethal overs, only Chris Tipper, 62, showing any defiance.. Alderley had totted up an impressive 239-7, Charlie Reid 85, Adam Worrall 53, Scott Kirwin 4-39.

## **Eighth win for Toft**

Toft edged up into third place with their eighth victory, achieved by two wickets in a close game at Didsbury. The home team closed on 205-9, an innings dominated by skipper Nick Anderson with a magnificent 105 not out from just 65 balls, including six fours and eight sixes. Jimmy Lomas did his usual tight stuff from one end with 4-93 off 27 overs and Jake Dickenson 3-55. Toft's reply of 206-8 in 53.1 overs was highlighted by a quality knock of 96 not out from only 79 balls (eight fours and four sixes) from teenager Henry Hughes, while Jonny Fawcett took 4-79 Oxton roused themselves after four defeats in five games when they outplayed retiring champions Nantwich, who were dismissed for 103 after slumping from 79-4. The damage was done by Worcestershire spinner Shaaiq Choudhry (5-32) making a rare appearance, aided by Martyn Evans, 4-28 only Rob Cook-Sievwright, 44, offering a defiant bat. Oxton replied with 104-3 in 27 overs, Martyn Evans completing a good day's work with 66.

Bowdon won by eight wickets at Grappenhall and although remaining in 10<sup>th</sup> place now lie an apparently safe distance of 50 points above relegation-placed placed Didsbury. Grappenhall were bowled out for 190, Josh McClelland 57, Chris Ashling 4-48. Bowdon replied with an impressive 193-2, Aussie Trent McCormick 89 not out, Simon Marshall 51 and former Lancashire opener Mark Chilton marking his first league appearance of the season with a solid 30.

**POSITIVE CRICKET** This was the third week running with no drawn games in the Premiership. Saturday's positive cricket yielded 2,232 runs for the loss of 83 wickets, average score 186-7.

The last drawn game was on Saturday, July 13: Marple v Toft.

# **No stopping Bramhall?**

BRAMHALL's splendid form continued at the top of **Division One** with a nine wickets home defeat of Widnes and they now lead closest rivals Urmston by 37 points.

Widnes were ousted for 101 by Rupes Kitzinger, 4-46 and Ashley West, 3-28, Bramhall responding comfortably with 103-1, Matt Jamieson 53, Matt Hughes 35 not out.

Urmston recovered after their heavy defeat (by Bramhall) seven days earlier to win by nine wickets at Heaton Mersey, whom they dismissed for 126, Matt Parkinson 4-35. With an unbeaten 52, Matt Downes, top-scored as the UCG men cruised home by nine wickets.

Cheadle Hulme continue to enjoy their best season for a long time, Aussie all-rounder Kris Nissen leading the way again with a spectacular double performance against Bredbury St. Mark's The Brisbane man contributed 104 as 'Hulme piled up 265-4 after being put in by Bredbury, Jordan Potts assisting with 55 and Adam Wilde 50. As usual, the St. Mark's batsmen made a good fist of it and reached 222, Chris Wood 54, Paul Wood 49. It was Nissen again, with 4-68, who proved their undoing with Ollie Potts enjoying even better figures of 4-42. Bredbury stay bottom.

There was a tense finish at Middlewich where the home side won by three runs against Brooklands. K.Clowes 47 and Stuart Price 46 not out helped 'Wich reach 214-9, Chris Potter 5-55. Brooklands went flat out for victory before closing on 211, AC. Hart 50.

There were runs galore at Christleton where the Little Heath men ended up with the wrong type of draw against Sale who did well to post 278-4, Jamal Benzafar 68 not out, Tyrone Lawrence 62, Keith Wellings 54, Calvin Flowers 60. Iro De Silva produced another of his classy innings after tea with 75, aided by Ben Patterson 42, but Christleton closed 10 runs short on 268-7, Lawrence taking 3-88.

The Oulton Park v Cheadle match was postponed until Sunday, August 18 by agreement because of a major car event at the nearby race track.

## FIRST TIE IN DIVISION 2

THE season's first tie in **Division Two** featured Poynton versus second-placed Stockport.

The Cale Green men batted first to post 152, Danny Williams 3-35. To which Poynton responded with .... 152, Williams 40. Mike Green took a key 6-64 to earn his side 16 points and the right to continue as promotion favourites in second place. Leaders Timperley failed to win for the second week running when they were held at home by Warrington, but still top the table by a mere 71 points. Timperley posted 274-7, Matt Macquet 85, Pat Ashling 80 and Warrington did well to reply with 207-8, Chris Kirby 46, although the points share of 14-8 in their disfavour would not suggest as much.

Congleton stay in the race with a 15 points return from a home draw with Davenham, a match interrupted for 23 minutes by rain. The Bears totalled 207, Jerrym Lamb 61, Danny Hancock taking an impressive 6-78. Davenham came up with 170-9, John Copeland 6-48.

At the foot of the table, things are looking bleak for Bollington and Stockport Georgians, both of whom were again beaten. Bolly lost by two wickets at home to Irby in a tight game after totalling 139, A. Cummings 7-38. Possibly securing their league status for 2014, Irby scraped home at 140-8 with one ball remaining, A. Williams 37, S. Khan 6-58.

Georgians were obliged to admire the all-round ability of Weaverham's Antiguan Wilden Cornwall in their heavy home defeat by the League newcomers. Cornwall scored 107 off 88 deliveries and put on 163 for the fourth wicket with James Lewis, 91 in a team tally of 236-8, Jeremy Devlin 5-58. Georgians' reply of 179 might have been more but for Cornwall's astute use of the ball, his return of 8-63 completing the best individual performance of the season in any division. Adam Gaskarth, 52 and debutant Mike Kilbride, 43, did their best in Georgians' batting line-up.

Tattenhall won their south-Cheshire derby at Alvanley by eight wickets, spinner Dave Shewring taking 3-35 to help restrict his former team mates to a modest 153-9. Tatters replied with 154-2, the excellent Kiwi Dan Power scoring 66 and Ollie Thompson 59 not out.

## RedInsure T20 revenge for Hyde

HYDE reached the ECB t20 Area Finals when they scored a thrilling, five wickets, last over victory over Neston before a large c crowd at Timperley on Tuesday, July 31.

Winning the League's **RedInsure T20** for the second time in three seasons – and a record third overall - Hyde turned the tables on Neston who had beaten them in a last ball thriller at Parkgate 12 months earlier

Neston clocked up an impressive 171-8 thanks to clean hitting by Luke Camden (34), Dave Manchett (31) and Chris Hackett (29). Hyde bowlers took a hammering, with Dan Cranmer's three wickets costing 43 runs.

Hyde's experienced batsmen always give the impression that they can achieve any target and they set off at full steam with Tom Twiney, 27, Scott Kirwin, 27 and especially James Duffy, all going well. With the light fading, 31 runs were needed off the last three overs, 19 off the last two and 12 off the 20<sup>th</sup>. In fact, they needed only three balls as Cranmer hammered two sixes on either side of a wide to clinch victory and finish with 25 runs with Duffy by now out for a superb 61 which deservedly won him the Man of the Match award. Paul Stimson, 2-9 and the pacy Ashley Davis, 2-33 were the best Neston bowlers.

The trophy was presented to Hyde skipper Danny Berry by Ron Graham. The other awards were handed out by Val Warburton representing sponsors RedInsure and League chairman David Humpage. These included cheques for all four finalists: Hyde £250; Neston £100; Oxton and Timperley both £50, while Neston's Dave Manchett won the champagne award for his brilliant outfield catch to dismiss Chris Tipper.

The Finals Days were managed by League secretary Geoff Wellsteed who thanked both teams for a fine performance, the scorers and umpires, the sponsors, Timperley for their excellent organisation and Competition secretary Mike Talbot-Butler and Wyn TB for administering the competition during the previous three months.

Hyde now go through to represent the League in the **ECB t20 Area Finals** at Werneth Low on Sunday, August 11. They will play North Staffs & South Cheshire League T20 winners Stone at 10.30 a.m. followed by Shrewsbury (Birmingham League) v the North Wales winners at 1p.m. The two winning leagues then meet at 4 p.m. for the right to progress to the Regional Final on Sunday, August 25.

All-England Finals Day is at the Brit Oval on Friday, September 13.
