First win in 14 games for Toft

IT was a Red Letter Day for Toft when they won by 10 wickets at Widnes, breaking a run of 14 **ECB Premier League** games without a victory since July 30 last season.

Nor were there any half-measures, Widnes being routed for 76 in 37 overs by the contrasting spin of club chairman Nigel Muirhead, with 5-19 off 18 overs and England Under 15 cap Robin Jones, 4-19 off 14. Toft openers knocked off the runs at 76-0 in 16 overs, Toby Drummond 41, Jake Hancock 36 to complete a 25-0 0 whitewash. It was Widnes' third defeat in a row after a bright start.

Otherwise it was a day of high scoring, seven teams topping 200 runs as the sun shone brightly and the bowlers laboured.

Champions Nantwich continued their modest start to the campaign with a 41 runs defeat at Neston who ran up 206, Luke Camden 52, Jimmy Warrington 5-73. Chris Finegan again turned up trumps with a return of 6-41 off 13 lethal overs in the Dabbers' reply of 165 all out, Ray Doyle scoring a fighting 60. Worrying times for the Dabbers, these, with three defeats and only two wins in their first six outings.

Oxton enjoyed a winning draw (13-7) at Chester Boughton Hall where many ex-players met up. Former Kiwi Test star Lou Vincent scored an unbeaten 103 and Guyan Fernando 43 in Oxton's formidable 226-9, Mark Rowland 4-40. Chester hung on at 167-8, Lee Dixon 44. Oxton staying 19 points clear at the top of the table.

Danny Berry 103, but Hyde held

Reviving Alderley Edge did well to outplay Hyde at Werneth Low, although they had to be content with a 13-8 draw after posting 266-6, Calum Rowe 81, Tom Young 4-86. Hyde were indebted to skipper Danny Berry, 103 and wicket-keeper Mark Makin, 50 not out for a reply of 231-8, Jason Whittaker taking 3-58. Possibly the best innings played in the League so far this season – in the eyes of delighted skipper Barney Cutbill, at least - came from Macclesfield's Khalid Sawas in a notable 68 runs home victory over Didsbury. In the form of his life, Sawas followed knocks of 98 and 63 with a superb 142 not out, pasting the ball to all corners of the ground in a tally of 221-6, reaching his century with a fabulous reverse sweep for six. Nick Anderson did his best to contain with 3-41. Didsbury mustered only 153, their innings being notable for another fine individual effort, from their hard-hitting South African Johan van Schalkwyk, who scored 69. before Rob Porter, 4-32 and Ian Tait, 4-55 ensured full home points.

Highest team tally of the season so far came from Urmston who piled up 291-5 in a drawn match at Marple. Chris Watson scored 108 and Nick Fawcett 74 in an opening stand worth 170, while teenager Joe Cash toiled away for an admirable 3-83 from 27 unchanged overs in the sunshine. Marple replied decently, reaching 230-5, Andy McGuinness 62, James Crisall 52.

New points system review

THE new points system in operation throughout the League this season has been all the buzz and while many players have welcomed the changes, there have also been grumbles.

League chairman David Humpage told the Cricket Committee at their May meeting that he would like to conduct a survey among all club captains at the season's half-way stage, in early July.

He said: "Obviously we cannot make changes during the season, but it would be interesting to learn what clubs think so far, especially now that the better weather, firmer wickets and bigger scores have arrived". So look out for the chance to have your say on the League's hottest topic.

Lift-off for Bramhall

BRAMHALL recorded their first victory in **Division One** when they beat Heaton Mersey by nine wickets at Church Lane, depositing their visitors to bottom spot in the table.

Mersey were all out for 85, Peter Vermeulen 32, Simon Wilkinson taking 4-28 from 21 accurate overs. Bramhall replied with 86-1, Jack Harris scoring an unbeaten 60.

Umpiring at Bramhall, Appointments secretary Jon Hacking had to go to hospital after receiving a full-blooded hook shot in the face at square leg. Club members rallied round and Jon was taken to Stepping Hill Hospital where a fractured cheekbone and damaged nerve ends were diagnosed. He was later allowed to go home to North Wales, but cried off a Cheshire Cup game on Sunday at Northwich - on his wife's advice. Jon says: "I would like to thank all the kind people who helped me at Bramhall, especially George Hill who drove me to hospital. They were all a credit to the League. I have go to the Countess of Chester Hospital for a check-up, but hopefully they will find nothing further amiss. I'm a tough old bird, you know" At the top of the table, Grappenhall became the only club in the League to extend their 100 pc record into six games, with a seven wickets stroll against Bollington at Broad Lane. Bollington were bowled out for 144, number 9 batsman Mo Jahangir 34, Aussie all-rounder Jason Smith taking 6-35 and Sam Guest 3-9. Adam Roylance, 62 not out and Luke McCoy, 53, both batted well as Grappers responded with 147-3. Grappenhall lie 37 points clear of Sale who again faltered in their derby match at Brooklands after posting 187-7, Ian Dixon 59 not out, A.J. Hall 3-42, Naveed Din 3-70. Brooklands got close at 184-6, needing a four to win off the last ball, but having their number seven batsman caught. Nafees Din top-scored with 56 not out, while Rick Halkon took 3-59 for Sale who emerged 10 – 8 points to the good.

Ball 139 for Bowdon

Bowdon's fourth win was by five wickets at the expense of Bredbury St. Mark's in a high-scoring game at Pennine Road. Bredbury looked safe at 260-6, Paul Wood 63, Gareth Edwards 3-109. But they reckoned without a remarkable innings from Stephen Ball, who hit 139 in a reply of 261.

Cheadle Hulme played impressively in a four wickets win on the perfect Christleton track which Brian Wareing and his dedicated band of helpers nurture so expertly. Promoted from number 8, teenage wicket-keeper Rob Marks scored 65 and Ben Patterson 46 in Christleton's par score of 228-5. Cheadle Hulme, who could be promotion contenders this season, paced their reply well against Christleton's battery of spinners and got home at 231-6, skipper Adam Wilde maintaining his good form with 71 and Tom Briscoe 45 not out. Ifti Naseer took 4-90.

After two defeats, Oulton Park were back to winning ways against Irby at Little Budworth, roundly outplaying their Wirral visitors. Skipper Greg Shillinglaw top-scored with 47 in Irby's tally of 189, Craig Williamson taking 6-57 and Danny Leech 4-57. Park knocked the runs off at 190-6 with seven overs to spare, Nick James 46, Rick Moore 44, the best Irby bowling again coming from Rob Houghton with 4-61 off 20 overs.

Middlewich go top

WITH Congleton losing their first game, Middlewich took the opportunity to go top of **Division Two** with a seven wickets win at bottom team Malpas.

Malpas batsmen topped 100 for only the second time in six innings, with a decent 188-9, Rob Orde 68, but were never allowed to strike loose against Stephen Parry, 5-41. An outstanding innings of 104 not out off 128 balls by Jamie Williams sent Middlewich racing to a seven wickets win in 39 overs after the tea break.

Cheadle lie a close second after an impressive four wickets win at Congleton, the south-Cheshire side batting first to tally 190-7, Aussie Jye Bailey 95 not out, Paul Sperring 4-77. Skipper Sperring completed a satisfactory day with 53 not out as his side edged home by four wickets with an over to spare.

Also unbeaten, Poynton did well to beat doughty Warrington at London Road. Tom Poole, 39, top-scored in Warrington's 188-9, Damien Stringer 3-31. Poynton replied with 189-6, Brian Kingham rolling back the years for a chanceless, unbeaten 58 aided by Stringer, 39. With 4-71, Kyle Adams fought hard to keep Warrington in the game.

Macquet - Wood add 184

Timperley are showing marked signs of improvement, continuing their upsurge with a 180 runs home win over Tattenhall after declaring early on 284-3 from 45 overs. Quality young Kiwi Matt Macquet, 123 and former Lancashire batsman Nathan Wood, 92 put on 184 for the second wicket, Macquet reaching his century from 86 balls. Tattenhall replied with 104, John Gibbon 31, having to answer to the skills of the brothers Grindley, Craig taking 4-19 and Ian 4-31.

Stockport batted well to post 231-7 at Upton, G. Barber 78, S. Edwards 70 not out. Upton hung on at 177-9, M. Ingram 65 not out.

Stockport Georgians registered their first victory and edged newly-promoted Alvanley into 11th place with a convincing six wickets home win. Nick Geddis, 38, top-scored in Alvanley's below par 160, Ifti Hussein taking 5-40 and Georgians replied with 164-5, Adam Gaskarth 70.

Orchestrated appealing outlawed

THE League Cricket Committee have issued a memo to all team captains warning them about an increase in orchestrated and excessive appealing in games at all levels this season.

In a widely circulated letter, League Secretary Geoff Wellsteed writes: "The Cricket Committee is determined to stamp out this unwelcome trend and it requires you to appeal to all players about this unacceptable deterioration. This is against the Spirit of Cricket.

Panel umpires, meanwhile, have been reminded of their obligations to notify incidents as per the League's Disciplinary Code (handbook page 254, C2a) and to reflect such behaviour in their Fair Play marks (page 250). Team captains are responsible at all times for ensuring play is conducted within the Spirit of the Game as well as within the Laws.

The Cricket committee requires all captains to re-read the ECB Code of Conduct and the League's Disciplinary Code (pages 250 - 257) and to ensure you play a personal part in seeking to improve the overall standards of behaviour. I am sorry to be writing such a strong letter, but I know that you will be anxious to ensure the high standards set by the League are maintained. This letter makes specific reference to panel umpires, but the letter relates to all levels of cricket regardless of who is officiating.

ALL captains should act".
