Rivals meet with nine points between them

IF ever there has been a title defining fixture in the **ECB Premier League** in recent seasons it is the return meeting of two current pacemakers Chester Boughton Hall and Neston at Parkgate next Saturday.

Both clubs won again – both for the 13th time - to retain the nine points status quo and current form probably favours Chester, their last six results reading WDWWW while Neston's run is WDDWWW. The clubs' two September fixtures show that Chester host Grappenhall and wind-up at Oxton, while Neston go to Bowdon and finish at home to Grappenhall.

On a day of soft wickets after overnight rain, there were fewer runs scored than usual with no centuries and all six games were resolved as tension mounts at both ends of the table.

Boughton Hall won by nine wickets at Didsbury after dismissing the bottom club for 135, Nick Anderson 37, Jordan Clark 4-22, Alex Kegg 3-29. Warren Goodwin finished unbeaten with 56 in Chester's response of 137-1 inside 20 overs, becoming the first Premiership batsman to top 1,000 runs (1,045 to be exact). This is the fourth time Goodwin has topped four figures in the past five seasons, the exception being in 2012 when he managed only 506 due to injury. Neston found it harder work to pocket full points on the ground of retiring champions Nantwich, who opted to bat first and posted 165-7, Ray Doyle 44, Chris Finegan 3-41. Neston responded with 166-8, inside the last over, Jack Smith scoring 38 and Luke Camden 33, while Ollie Griffiths took 3-40 and Jimmy Warrington 3-74.

Macc stir it up

Down at the foot of the table Macclesfield have stirred up a hornet's nest with their third win in five outings, by five wickets at home to Grappenhall, who were dismissed for 119, Jack Ward 4-55, Chris Moores 3-2. Rob Keen then top-scored with 35 in Macc's response of 122-5.

Meanwhile, Bowdon and Marple lost and both are now within catching distance for Macclesfield in what should be a lively run-in. At South Downs Road, Bowdon were bowled out by Hyde for 78, Simon Marshall 37, Dan Cranmer 6-42. Chris Ashling's pace (5-23) later had the Hyde batsmen on the hop and they struggled to reach 79-7, Tom Twiney's 17 being the best individual contribution.

Marple lost by four wickets at home to Alderley Edge after being bowled out for 135, James Crisall 58, Mark Warnes 3-4, Jason Whittaker 3-61. With a polished innings of 69, Calum Rowe led Alderley's winning response of 138-6, Andy Wylie taking 4-44.

Oxton's upsurge continued at Toft, inspired by Worcestershire all-rounder Shaaiq Choudhry. He scored an unbeaten 61 and, along with skipper Simon Stokes, 70 and Alex Hughes, 51, Oxton mustered a best-of-the-day 233-6, Jimmy Lomas 3-61, Jake Dickinson 3-66. Toft were bowled out for 156, Jake Hancock 55, Henry Hughes 41, their last seven batsmen scoring only 12 runs. Choudhry claimed 6-63 off 18 over of left arm spin.

HYDE PIPPED AT ORMSKIRK

HYDE had the heart-breaking experience of losing by one run at Ormskirk in the ECB t20 North-West Regional final on Sunday. The Liverpool Competition club now go through to the National Finals Day at the Brit Oval on Friday, September 13.

Bramhall almost there

THEIR 13th victory of the season – by 185 runs against lowly Heaton Mersey at Church Lane – takes Bramhall to within one further 25 pointer of promotion from the **First Division.**

They overwhelmed 'Mersey after being put in to rattle up 240-7 in 46 overs before an early declaration, Matt Jamieson 75, skipper Nick Cantello 49. Mersey were dismissed for 55, the second lowest divisional tally of the season, by Simon Wilkinson and Rupes Kitzinger, bowling unchanged to return 7-27 and 3-25 respectively.

Urmston remain a hot tip for the second promotion spot after they equalled Bramhall's wins tally with a seven wickets demolition of Bredbury at the UCG. St. Mark's, whose hopes of avoiding relegation are slim, were bowled out for 95, Darren Carr 39, Sumit Panda 5-22, Matt Parkinson 3-17. Urmston knocked the runs off at 98-3 in 29 overs, Lewis Jackson 28 not out.

Winning run ends

The top two are now sitting pretty because Cheadle Hulme's winning run came to an end at Sale where they suffered their first defeat in 11 games since June 15. The Grove Park batsmen mustered only 156-9, Phil Balderson 47 not out, and Sale replied with 160-7 Chris Canning 47, Kris Nissen 5-57.

Brooklands' decline after a bold first half to the season, continued when they lost by 88 runs at home to Oulton Park, who scored 200-9 batting first, Martyn East 68. Brooklands were bowled out for 112, Craig Douglas 3-15, Tom Bannister-Wright 3-33.

Christleton continued their late sprint with a 22 runs win at Cheadle after posting just 159, Matt Astbury 59, Paul Sperring 3-20, Dan Brown 3-29. Only Andy Wilson, 40, cut the mustard after tea as Cheadle were bowled out for 137 by Ifti Naseer, who had the superb figures of 6-41 off 16 overs.

Widnes also ensured safety with a 46 runs win against fading Middlewich at Beaconsfield Road after posting a useful 215-8, Phil Catterall 45, Tom Shepherd 3-29, Stephen Parry 3-59. Middlewich were all out for 169, a total which would have been considerably less without a fine contribution from number 11 batsman Nigel Stubbs, whose unbeaten 42 was the top innings of the game. Alex Graham took 4-79.

Record 10-40 for Bolly's Syed Khan

WITH only one previous **Second Division** win all season, Bollington beat high-flying Warrington by 46 runs at the Recreation Ground thanks to a League record bowling return of 10-40 by Syed Khan.

Khan's performance topped the previous best league bowling performance of 10-41 by Brooklands' John Birchall against Urmston in 2004. It is the first 10 wickets haul in 1st XI cricket since Bapa Mukherjee's 10-59 for Widnes against Chester in the Premier League the following year.

Warrington were bowled out for 70 (Chris Kirby 27) after Bolly had mustered just 116, of which Aussie Travis Salisbury scored 33. Warrington's Aussie paceman Kyle Adams claimed 7-57 to take his tally for the season to 77 wickets. This would normally have been a match-winner, but not on Saturday.

The match result sheet indicates that Khan bowled two of his victims, had two lbw and the six others were caught. And all this while his colleague Mo Ali at the other end wound up with figures of 16-6-30-0!

Bolly remain bottom of the table, five points below Stockport Georgians, although they do remain within shouting distance of Alvanley who lost by eight wickets at Weaverham. Antiguan all-rounder Wilden Cornwall was again the Weaverham matchwinner, his 6-70 return restricting Alvanley to 170-8 (Andy Bennion 49). Cornwall, 60 and Ian Eaton, 53, both not out, then batted their side to an eight wickets victory. The Alvanley skipper will have noted that his side's last two crucial games are at Bollington and at home to Irby.

Timperley beaten again

There was a shock at the top where Timperley lost their second game in three weeks at the hands of another mid-Cheshire club, Davenham. Timperley were bowled out for 79, Dean Jackson taking 6-29 from 21 lethal overs and Davenham scraped home at 81-9, Ben Gallagher's unbeaten 17 being just enough to see his side through against Craig Grindley, 3-15 and Chris Page, 3-30. Stockport beat neighbouring Georgians by two wickets in a tight game at Cale Green and although they still lie 47 points behind the leaders, they are well placed to take the second promotion slot. Georgians were dismissed for 121, Rob Barber 4-26, Tom Facer 4-57, then replied with 122-8, Jeremy Devlin taking 5-54.

Congleton's hopes were finally dashed at Poynton where they lost by 28 runs after bowling out the home side for 142, Jerrym Lamb 4-25. Congleton mustered only 114, Ryan Brewer 54, Chris Oake 4-12.

Tattenhall retained a glimmer of hope with a massive win over Irby at the Flacca. Tatters piled up 258-5 in 45 overs led by 92 from Ollie Thompson, 58 to Dan Power and 52 from Steve Sadler. Irby reached 177 in reply, skipper Martyn Smith scoring 54 batting at eight and Dave Newman 34. Power took 4-61 and Tom Hyslop 4-35.

HYDE AGONY AT ORMSKIRK

HYDE went out of the **ECB National t20 knock-out** in a tense quarter-final before a huge crowd at Ormskirk on Sunday – by the agonising margin of one run.

The Liverpool Competition side raced ahead after winning the toss, scoring 60 in the first five overs and 80 after eight. Tidier bowling and fine catching and fielding then regained the initiative for Hyde with Tom Young taking a creditable 3-12 off his four overs and Dan Cranmer 2-15 as the Liverpool Competition side closed on a below par 141-7.

Hyde lost senior batsmen Chris Tipper and skipper Danny Berry for ducks at 5-2, before a magnificent stand of 105 between James Duffy (74 off 52 balls, three fours, six sixes) and Tom Twiney (45) put them in control. Both were then disastrously run out and Hyde never regained the initiative and eventually needed eight off the last over. They managed only six although there was a glitch between the umpires and scorers who posted the total one run short before the final delivery, from which Hyde scrambled a single to close on 140-6.

Cheshire title ... now for Cambs

CHESHIRE clinched the **Minor Counties Western division** title with a high-scoring draw in their final match against rivals Shropshire at Nantwich from Sunday to Tuesday last week.

They will now meet Eastern division champions Cambridgeshire at Wisbech in a four-day play-off from Sunday to Wednesday, September 8 to 11. They are likely to be without James Duffy, unavailable due to starting work at Wilmslow High School and the injured Rick Moore

When word came through on Monday evening that Wales had won by 10 wickets against Dorset, Cheshire knew that a draw with a majority of bonus points would be sufficient to pip Shropshire on the last day

In the first innings, they had totalled a massive 455-8 highlighted by a personal best 203 from Hyde's Duffy. Shropshire replied with 391-8, trailing by 64 runs with Shrewsbury opening left hander Steve Leach unbeaten on 157.

Overnight on Monday, Cheshire were 137-5 still with work to do and they duly achieved that on the last day, reaching 329, thanks largely to Oulton Park's Rick Moore who scored 116, a maiden county century, despite needing a runner due to an apparent side strain. This left Shropshire needing an impossible 393 to win and they meandered to 116-5, Leach again remaining unbeaten withv40 meaning he was on the field throughout the match.

Both sides took 11 points rendering Cheshire champions by three points from Wales, with identical records.

Cheshire skipper Danny Woods (York) finished with 52 wickets in the six games, five of which were won. He said afterwards: "We have come a long way since under-performing in the one day games. Everyone has played his part and team spirit has been incredible".
